Well, spring is here again and has already brought out a burrow full of babies. Within one week 2 mothers, 4 litters and 2 single babies were all dumped at rescues or vets and were surrendered to RRO. And yet another surprise last weekend, one of the mothers (Joy) came to us with one litter 3 weeks ago, then another litter was found last Sunday. It is important that the mother and father buns are separated immediately after birth as mother can get pregnant within 24hrs, unfortunately they weren't surrendered in time to do this.

This is just the beginning of the breeding season and yet another friendly reminder that

responsible pet ownership includes vet checks and de-sexing, regardless of the animal. We are very much at capacity now at the orphanage. These babies will be available for adoption when they are old enough. Contact RRO if you are interested in adopting these or other buns.

Fostering can also be a great way of meeting and getting to know a bun before adopting and some people find that they form a bond with their little fosterling and end up adopting them into their family.

We have a number of buns that are ready and waiting for foster care, including some of our VIB bunnies who would love to share a home with an experienced carer.
