Why we need Rabbit Welfare Laws

The Seaford Rescue Saga: In September 2016, residents in the Seaford area noticed many rabbits in their street, some were killed by cars and predators and the others seemed very scared. One resident caught many of the rabbits and went to return them to the neighbouring property. The woman that lived there took no responsibility for them as 'they were her 5 year old son's animals'. The rescuer took the animals and called the Orphanage.

From the 7 adults, 4 females were pregnant and three had litters. The surviving babies are in foster care. One mother was too

young and was not producing milk, so even with the best efforts, her babies all died. This irresponsibility could have populated the street with 37 more rabbits, then the females would continue to collectively produce another 36 babies every 4 weeks until the females died from exhaustion. All the offspring would be at breeding age at 4 to 6 months of age.

Due to government inaction we now have a pet rabbit problem as well as a feral rabbit problem. It is from situations like this that Animal Welfare Laws for rabbits is needed.

Rabbit Run-Away Orphanage has put in a submission to the Victorian Government for its Draft Action Plan 2016-2021 "Improving the Welfare of Animals in Victoria".

The House Rabbit

Handy Hints for keeping your House Rabbit safe

We have come a long way from tiny rabbit hutches in the back of a garden, a lonely rabbit pining for attention but destined to live out their short lives in isolation.

Sure, we know this still happens, but as pet rabbits become more popular in Australia, we are seeing an increase of more comfortable, social, indoor areas constructed to allow the house rabbit to become part of the family.


Watching a house rabbit is a wonderful thing - you can see their personalities blossom when in closer contact with their human buddies and comfortable surroundings (as is usually the case for us too).

So you'd like a house rabbit? Here are some tips to set them up for a long, happy life:

Create a secure and cosy bunny home

A simple and inexpensive way of setting up a bunny-corner is with some pet fencing. Various sizes can be found at reasonable prices on eBay.

For flooring, lino is a great way of protecting your home's floors and can usually be purchased by the metre at a hardware store such as Bunnings.



Top the lino with some old towels, bath mats or rugs and your bunny has a place to run around without slipping.

Install the bathroom - a hay box (a cat litter tray) is best

lined with recycled paper pet litter and hay for easy cleaning every other day.



All you need now is a water bowl, a few toys, boxes or cat tunnels for some privacy, and a rabbit (or two) to complete the home.

Bunny proof your home

You have made your rabbit a lovely home, but you must also protect yours - most bunnies are curious so it's important to ensure your house is protected and is safe for the rabbit.

Areas to consider:

electrical cords, your walls, skirting, doors and furniture are all potential chew-toys. Remove or move dangerous items such as rodent baits, medicines, toxic plants, sharp objects

FOSTER CARERS NEEDED

Do you have room in your hearts and homes to look after some of our buns until the end of January 2017? Short and long term foster homes are needed during one of the busiest periods of the year. For those that have not had rabbits before, this will also give you the opportunity to trial rabbits as a pet and help out the Orphanage as well.

Fostering: Due to the high demand for our services, our Foster Program allows the Orphanage to assist more abandoned rabbits, by placing them temporarily or permanently offsite. Our Winston's Challenge Fundraiser has raised over \$5,400 over four collections during August and September for much needed vet care.


